Children in Mission

Did you know that Avondale children and their families are making a difference in the world? During Lent, our elementary-age children filled two Disaster Relief buckets with work gloves, scrub brushes, clotheslines, Lysol scrub, insect repellant, and sponges. Every year, disasters happen; this year someone will be helped by our children's gifts. Thank you children.

Also, our children have reached out to children across the sea who have been displaced from their homes, neighborhoods, and villages. Last summer during Bible Camp, in response to an urgent appeal by Church World Service, our children assembled and donated School Kits for children living in Syria. The supplies at Church World Service had decreased to just over 5,000 School Kits, against pending requests for 18,000 more. Our children decorated lightweight canvas bags and filled them with basic tools for learning: notebooks, pencils, erasers, crayons, rulers, scissors, etc. Generous donations allowed us to send 38 School Kits, one per child participating in Bible Camp.

Church World Service responds to needs of people buffeted by war, natural disaster and poverty here in the United States and around the world. Every year, our Easter offering to One Great Hour of Sharing is put to work by CWS responding to emergency and ongoing needs. Update from the Personnel Ministry Team

The Personnel Ministry Team would like to provide an update on both our big-picture goals and our near-term plans. Our primary goals are to ensure that staff members' job descriptions, goals and objectives are aligned with Avondale's mission; support staff members in their quest to achieve these goals and objectives; and work with staff to identify ways to improve communications, so that the congregation at large will know what great things are being accomplished at Avondale.

To that end, we are making changes to the staff review process and how we communicate the results to others at Avondale. We are moving toward conducting all staff performance reviews at roughly the same time, rather than scattered throughout the year. This year all staff reviews were completed by the end of March. In future years, all reviews will be conducted in February. The review process now includes the development of clear, measurable goals for each staff position. Achievements and outcomes of these goals will be used during ongoing performance reviews, allowing us to move to a merit-based pay process. Upon completion of this year's reviews and goal development, the Personnel Ministry Team will share the staff goals with the Session.


